

**Operative Freemasonry Wages:** In ancient operative times, the Master of the Work received the highest wages. His wages were corn, oil, wine and sometimes the coin of the realm.

Fellowcraft and Entered Apprentice wages were less than the Master, but they were kept in "meat & drink".

**Speculative Freemasonry Wages:** Masonic wages are not earned in coin but are the rewards earned through acts of kindness, good deeds of service, and the gift of time to others.

They are earned by mentoring other brethren, helping others, remembering the widow and the orphan and visiting the sick. In short, wages are earned much as the Bible verse says:

"Do unto others as you would have them do unto you"...

### This Month in Masonic History

March 4<sup>th</sup>, 1792 – The Grand Lodge of Massachusetts was formed.
March 17<sup>th</sup>, 1856 – The Grand Lodge of Kansas was formed.
March 23<sup>rd</sup> 1887 – Sir Arthur Conan Doyle received his 3rd degree.
March 25<sup>th</sup>, 1882 – The Grand Lodge of Arizona was formed.

## THE NORTHEAST CORNER

### David "The King of the Wilderness" Crockett (August 17<sup>th</sup>, 1786 – March 6<sup>th</sup>, 1836)

A legend of his own time, Davy Crockett ran away from home at the age of 12 because of his dislike of school. He returned home 3yrs later and paid for his own education. Crockett was the archetype of the American frontiersman and was famous for his ability to shoot the flame off of a candle at 100 yards. He once killed 105 Bears in a single season, some with a knife. Crockett was elected to US Congress in 1827, 1829 & 1833. Popular for his honesty and home-spun forthrightness, he loudly opposed President Jackson's mistreatment of the Indians. Following his defeat in the 1835 election, an angry Crockett told his TN constituents, "You all can go to hell – I'm goin' to Texas!"

On Feb. 8<sup>th</sup> 1836, Crockett and his 12 "Tennessee Boys" rode into the Alamo. His tall tales and quick wit held the morale of the men high during the worst days of the siege. On the morning of March 6<sup>th</sup>, as the Mexicans finally overwhelmed the Alamo, Crockett was the last to die.

Proof that Crockett was a Mason is based mainly on the survival of his Masonic Apron, made for him by Mrs. A.C. Massie of Washington D.C., during his tenure in Congress. Before leaving for TX, he entrusted the apron to the Sherriff of Weakley County, TN and it was inherited and preserved by the Sherriff's nephew, E.M. Taylor of Paducah, KY. The lodge at Weakley County, near the Crockett home, burned during the Civil War destroying all the lodge records.
