"we cannot teach to others what we do not understand".


A half-hearted exposure to freemasonry will not suffice to achieve the minimum requirements of a real mason.

Oil Boom Helping out Kids

A gift from the past is giving Texas Scottish Rite Hospital for Children a boost for the future. With the oil boom, the hospital has received roughly \$500 million in oil and gas royalties over the past four years, most of it related to a West Texas ranch donated to the organization in the 1960's. These royalties helped the not-for-profit hospital nearly double the value of its own investments- the institution's endowment- to about \$2 Billion. Last year, the hospital revealed plans for a multimillion-dollar outpatient care center in Frisco, the organization's first satellite expansion from its central Dallas location. Founded by a group of Texas Scottish Rite Masons in 1921, the hospital specializes in pediatric orthopedics. Until recently, the TSRHC never billed patients for services, but after two years of debate the hospital did start billing insurance providers in 2012. The TSHFC has about 15,000 current patients and has treated more than 230,000 kids in its 94 year history.

Editor's note: the above is excerpts from a July 7, Dallas Morning News story. Our lodge has a number of Scottish Rite Masons and we are very proud of the splendid work the Texas Scottish Rite Hospital for Children has done for nearly a century in Dallas.

Spotlight on a Brother

This month we sat down with Brother David Barnett. David was raised as a Master Mason in August 1984 in Lone Star Lodge No. 403 in Denison, TX. He has served our Lodge for a number of years having held the office of Historian in 2014, and currently is our Junior Deacon. David grew up in Denison having graduated from Denison High School in 1969. He received a Bachelor's Degree in Business Administration from Southeast State University of Oklahoma, and served in the United States Air Force as part of NORAD.

David has been married to his wife Cindy for 43 years. He and Cindy have two daughters: Jennie and Staci; and three grandchildren: David, Samantha (NOT SAM!!), and Luke.

Brother Barnett enjoys hunting and fishing and you can find him on facebook. He enjoys the fraternal brotherhood of Masonry and meeting new young masons. He shared with us that one of his disappointments with the world today was the "lack of personal responsibility" demonstrated by too many people today.


Scatter-shooting from the west:
